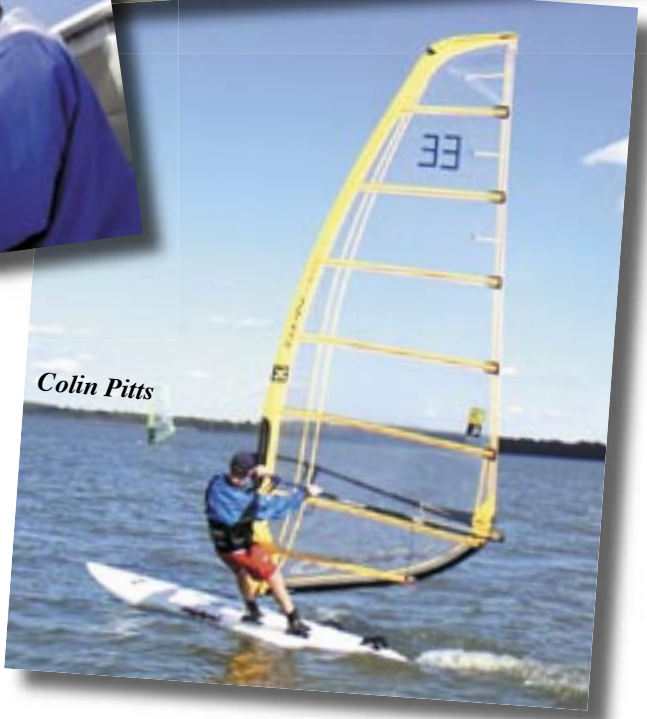

Avon 2004:

It's time to sign up for this spring's fun!

Two trips in 2004: Spring: April 3 – 10 and Fall: October 9 – 16

We have Soundfront houses for each of our sojourns to our traditional windy vacation spot in Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. The houses are the newest in Avon, are very spacious, and have hot tubs, great beach launches, great rigging, lots of storage, and nice gathering areas. We anticipate the same activities that we have enjoyed on this year's trips: short board clinics, novice clinics, board demos, sail demos, raffles, social events, a beach bonfire, and discounts at local shops. Our philosophy: we get the best houses, we do not over fill, and we charge just enough to cover our costs. There is no cost increase over

last year!

Last April, the air and water temperatures were in the 50s, much lower than in previous trips (normally in the 70s). It was also very windy and rainy. That was ok, as the houses all have hot tubs and we all had good wet suits. Historically, April is the windiest month on the Cape. Last October, the air and water temperatures were much warmer and we had 3 good planing days.

We will separately solicit reservations for each trip. I am now taking reservations for only the April trip. The fall trip solicitation will be coming out in May. Based on an email survey I took in December, we rented only 2 Island Creek houses for the April trip. That means that there are only 6 private rooms and 4 shared rooms available for this trip. PARADISE FOUND

This past October **Steve Cohen and I** went to Brazil for a unique windsurf adventure. Last Year **Vila Bela Vista Lodge** owned by Jodi Thompson and **Tico Winds** owned by Peter Hopley, offered BABA a free week of room/board and equipment rental in the town of Jericoacoara, Brazil. At last years winter BABA winter party at the Riach's house I was the lucky winner of the drawing for the trip. Here is the tale of our adventure.

Brazil is a big place. Most Americans do not realize that Brazil is one of the largest countries in the world. The land area of Brazil is only 10% less than the United States and they have a population in excess

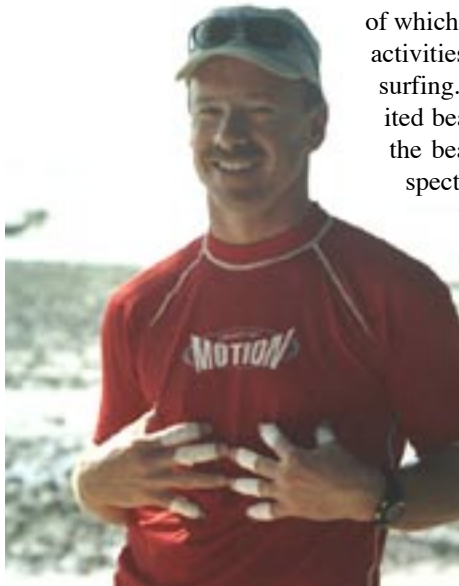
of 170 million. Why am I telling you this? Because to get to Jeri, you need to set aside about 30 hours of travel- each way. Believe me, it is worth the trek. The town of Jericoacoara, (Jeri) is on the Northeast coast of Brazil, just south of the equator. The sun is very strong with air temps in the high 90's and water temps in the upper 80's. They have 2 seasons, one dry and the other rainy. The best time for windsurfing is the dry period from June through November with September and October being the windiest months. It is windy every day on the coast. The wind blows all the time with the exception of a brief hiatus from 3:00AM to 6:00AM. We had 6 straight days of 4.4 winds and one day of 5.0. If you are into freestyle this place is heaven with steady winds and shallow warm water. Many of the European sailors would throw loops on the outbound tack and throw Willy Skippers and Spocks on the inbound transition. There are also very friendly waves. I have heard they can get big but for the most part they were in the 18 to 30" range which is great for entry level wave sailing.

The Jeri community origi-

nated as a fishing village. The best way to describe the town is an oasis by the sea. It faces a small tidal bay off the Atlantic Ocean and is surrounded on 3 sides by 200 foot high sand dunes. I am guessing the local population is around 1,200 people. The only way to access town is by driving along the beach - there are no paved roads and no paved sidewalks. Everything is sand. The tallest buildings are 2-stories and it is only within the last six years that the town has had electricity. The local people are very friendly and live very simple, happy lives. Few people have cars and most people get around by walking, motorcycle or horseback. The culture of the town revolves around the sea and everyone spends a lot of time on the beach or in the ocean. A majority of the sailors are Europeans. The Brazilian language is Portuguese, which is very different from Spanish. Many words appear to be spelled the same, but the pronunciation is quite different. The ability to speak Spanish is very helpful but there were many times that I had difficulty understanding the response I received in Portuguese. That being said the language challenges had no ill effect on the quality of our experience.

Our lodging was provided by **Vila Bela Vista**, established by Jodi, an American woman and her Brazilian partner Marcio. Jodi, originally a teacher from the Gorge, created the pousada (lodge compound) from the ground up. She has created a wonderful facility. They were really great hosts and treated us very well. Their villa is a green haven in an otherwise arid landscape. The rooms are very comfortable and feature private bathrooms and a stocked mini-fridge. The villa also has an in-ground pool. Each morning we were treated to a huge breakfast with fresh fruits, Brazilian coffee, home baked breads and eggs. Peter Hopley has a windsurfing concession on the beach with all new 2003 JP boards and Neil Pryde sails. We used

of which could fill several more pages of writing. Other activities include Kite boarding, horseback riding and surfing. If you like the sun, there are miles of uninhabited beaches. There are bars and restaurants right on the beach and the eye candy (see Sandy Rollins) is spectacular. Brazilians do not go topless but they use the smallest bikini's I have ever seen.

This was an amazing place to go. Unfortunately I do not have the writing skills of James Michener to paint an adequate picture. The combination of the culture, geography, people and beauty of Jericoacoara is really special. This is a unique environment and the windsurfing is just a small piece of the adventure. If this story piques your interest, I suggest you go soon. Jeri is just beginning to blossom as a tourist destination.

Its inaccessibility will most likely keep it on the list of the obscure however someday Jeri will become a staple tourist town. Luckily for now it is still pure and innocent.

To travel to Brazil, you will need a Visa. This is a very easy process and all of the information you need is accessible on the web. Vaccines are also recommended, Typhoid, Hepatitis and Malaria. I would also suggest taking a course of Cipro based antibiotics in case you get travelers dysentery. You can only use cash in the town of Jeri and small bills are a must. When you exchange cash at the airport request bills in the amount of 1's 5's and 10's. You may get lucky if you can use a 50 Realis bill but no one will break

a 100 Realis note. During our trip the exchange rate was about 2.8 Realis (pronounced hey-eyes) to the Dollar.



77 and 84 liter boards for the entire week. Peter's staff is very friendly and eager to help. Steve and I knew Peter from our trips to Costa Rica where Peter lives from December to April and operates the **Tico Wind** sailing center on Lake Arenal.

The food, beer and wine are excellent and inexpensive. You can eat right on the beach at lunch and there are many good restaurants in town for dinner. We took a dune buggy ride one morning to tour the surrounding areas. The landscape is very pretty. There are many fresh water lakes with blue water like the Caribbean. You can also drive on the sand dunes which is quite exciting. Off-road motorcycle touring is also touted as a great adventure. The experienced rider would love the opportunities, but for the novice rider - beware. **Steve Cohen** had an all day motorcycle adventure while we were there, the details

Bonaire From Above and Below

Having been to Bonaire 3 times in the last 2 years and looking forward to another visit in less than 8 weeks (52 days to be exact), we've got a few things to say about the sleepy, tranquil island with its crystalline water, clean air, friendly people, burros, iguana and a sport life that knocks us out.

The trip really gets started with a stop at Montego Bay Airport, where we feel the first Caribbean breezes and pick up a bottle of coconut rum for a few bucks. We're almost there. The plane lands in Bonaire, just minutes away from the lovely condo with the enormous veranda overlooking the water that beckons our daily dives.

Yes, I know we are windsurfers, but before the wind comes up or when we've worn ourselves out, the exquisite beauty of the pristine reef is just a step off the dock below. How can you refuse? I'll get back to that later. This is a windsurfing newsletter and you want to know about the windsurfing.

The first time Jeff and I went to Bonaire, March 2002, we spent most of our time at Lac Bay, a premier destination of windsurfers and kite boarders from Europe and the US. With its clear blue, 85 degree water, sandy bottom and two well-stocked boardsailing shops, it's flat water heaven. Well, almost. Now that we know to plan our trip for a waxing to full moon, and not expect all that much wind all the time, we're content. You see, Lac Bay was almost too shallow to windsurf the first time we were there. It's possible that some storm out at sea had swallowed more of the tide than usual, but we have seen a difference when the moon starts to disappear.

So, with the timing down, we plan our trips. Jeff, the most advanced sailor among us, chooses the shop and sets up the package. Jeff wants great gear, ready and waiting for him and suited to any wind conditions that come along. I'm going to need a couple of lessons (using my harness, deep-water beach starting, maintaining a plane). Jimmy and Alice Trosch have joined our semi-annual escapade and they are learning the basics, plus. Go, Alice and Jimmy!

After a couple of delightful weeks with Jibe City, last October we decided to give Bonaire Windsurf Place a try. The cafe at Jibe City can't be beat, but the gear, the service and the lessons at Bonaire Windsurf Place have got us going back.

Constantino Saragoza, Elvis Martinus and Roger Jurriens own and run The Place. You may recognize the names. Professional competitors for many years, they've represented the Netherlands and Aruba in the Olympics. It was a bit of a thrill for Jimmy, Alice and me to know that our gentle, encouraging, effective teacher was none other than Constantino Saragoza, Olympic representative for the Netherlands in Atlanta and Barcelona. Exuding Bonairean warmth and generosity, Constantino and his lovely wife, Licetha, shared the scrapbooks and plans for their young sons, Bjorn and Jurgen, who at 6 and 12 show the potential to take what their dad and uncle have done and reach for the stars.

With the latest beginner equipment, they had made sure that Alice and Jimmy had put in a couple of really good sessions and gained a lot of ground in the somewhat gentle breezes. (October is not the windiest month of the year). Their generosity with a waist harness allowed me to do most of what I hoped to do, and Jeff, used the upper end of their wide range of sails and boards, all with high quality fins, to reach the reef that keeps the bay so calm. He warns that the coral heads there can take out a fin, so be careful. (Jeff keeps looking at the leeward side of the island, with its broad run to Klein Bonaire, white caps and deep water. Maybe he'll give it a try this time.)

We had to pull ourselves away daily, even when we were finished windsurfing. How can you take your eyes away from a young boy doing heli-tacks, pros making the most graceful jibes, children trolling for fish off the backs of their boards, the palms, the waves crashing over the reef into the pale blue water and the white-skinned ecotourist who just did their first water start?

But there are dive boats to catch. After all, Bonaire may be even more famous



for its diving. The first environmentally protected park in the Caribbean, Bonaire's reefs are treated with care. No more than one small boat per dive site at any time, and well over 100 dive sites (many accessible from shore) make this the place to get your open-water PADI certification. Jeff and I did just that, much to the envy of our Baltimore dive class facing certification dives in the 55 degree, murky quarry. Jimmy and Alice, with decades of diving experience, take over here and plan our dives, teach us to make our tanks last longer and longer (who wants to come up to the surface any sooner than you have to?) and help us find the most wonderful and hidden sea creatures. With a great dive off our condo dock, early evening dives have shown us many unexpected wonders. Have you ever seen a fish curled up in a coral hammock for a snooze? And, then there is the night dive at renowned Town Pier that reveals a bright orange frog fish, glistening in the beam of a flash light, a tiny sea horse, a smiling porcupine fish.

There's a t-shirt on Bonaire that says "Diving, the sedative without the side effects." Yes, but that understates the reality. In Bonaire, the peace is truly blissful, the undersea wonders astonish and astound, and the adrenaline rush of a windsurfing session are sure to add new dimensions to the daydreams that fill the flight back and keep you from falling into the daily chores at home.

How do you top all that? With a nightly 4-star dinner, complete with great beer and wine, and a comfortable bed. Now that's what I call a vacation.

Windsurfing Resort (BRWR) in Cocoa Beach, Florida is a sign that reads "Go to the River." When **Ann Jackson and I** arrived early in the afternoon on Thursday, December 4 for one of Petra Kanz's winter clinics for women, we were welcomed by Taylor and shown to our rooms. It was a warm and sunny day and all was quite on the river. The clinic was not scheduled to begin until the following evening, but we mixed up our dates and ended up there a day early - a tough situation, but one we had to live with!

We threw our bags in our room and went in search of anyone who would let us know the rules of the road for equipment usage. We found **Petra Kanz**, the instructor for our clinic, relaxing and sunning in another grassy area behind her apartment and she and Taylor, the staff instructor at



BRWR, were happy to show us the equipment available. They have a couple dozen boards and sails of varying sizes already rigged. We made our selections and were on the water in a few minutes. The sailing site is shallow for the first couple hundred yards offshore, much like Hatteras. The wind backed off a bit and we soon brought our mid-sized boards back in and took out a couple of Prodigy boards for the afternoon. When we came in later that afternoon, Beth Powell Winkler, the founder of BRWR was there to "welcome us to her home." She told us that she and Petra were really pleased by

the representation of BABA members at the clinic that weekend. In addition to **Ann and myself, BABA members Janice Emerling, (along with her friend Jane from Canada) and Cinda Sebastian attended.**

The Banana River Windsurfing Resort is a comfortable and casual place and reminds me a lot of the atmosphere we

enjoy in Hatteras with our group houses. There's a grassy area between the buildings and the river, some tables and chairs for relaxing and a pier out on the river which provides a perfectly wonderful place to enjoy the sea and sun. In total the resort can accommodate up to 30 people in a combination of

small apartments and single and double rooms and some dorm type beds in the upstairs living area. abilities, usual equipment, time spent on the water and our goals for that weekend. With a relatively large group of people, she did a great job of covering instruction to benefit all of us.

The instruction was great, atmosphere relaxing, and company warm and friendly. All in all, it was a great time that I hope to repeat.
